This list is compiled from ships manifests and historical accounts of the docks, dating from the earliest mentions of Grimsby through to the present day. Records of goods carried on ships paint a picture of what was happening in Britain and around the world at the time as well as Grimsby's own fortunes — each of these words is the start of a story. Today's ship manifests tell the story of the rise in renewable energy. Original spellings and local names for types of fish have been retained.

Fish Dock Races is a colloquial term dating back to the early C20th for when women would collect their husbands wages from the docks. Poverty could be a real problem for some fishing families and there would be a rush to secure wages before they could be squandered in Grimsby's many pubs.

The pancake race run by members of the choir was a tradition of St James Church on Shrove Tuesday. Feel free to have a go yourself!

St James Church is named after the disciple of Jesus who called him, his brothers and other fishermen with the words Come follow me.
